

It's time to BAN Deceptive Practices in the Custodial Interrogation of Children!

What is **Custodial Interrogation**?

- Custody occurs when a person has been arrested and does not feel free to leave the police presence
- Interrogation occurs when police question a person about involvement in a crime

What is **Deception**?

- Lying to children in custody by either
 - misleading them to believe that confessing will result in a lesser sentence or their release
 - using false facts to threaten a confession
 - using false definitions of the law

Why are **Deceptive Practices a Problem?**

- Children are uniquely at risk of falsely confessing.
- In 2022, among persons exonerated for crimes that they were accused of committing when they were under 18 years old, 36% had provided a false confession.
- Among those exonerated for crimes that they were accused of committing when they were under 14 years old 86% falsely confessed to a crime they did not commit.

The Solution

- Pass a Ban on Deceptive Practices in Custodial Interrogation of Children.
- Make any statement taken from a child who has faced deceptive practices inadmissible as evidence in court.
