



YOUTH CHARGING REFORM ACT

2026 Legislative Priority | Protect Children

PROBLEM:



Maryland leads the nation in automatically charging children as adults. Kids as young as 14 face adult detention and prosecution for 33 different offenses.

Almost 85% of these cases return to juvenile court or are dismissed.

HARM:



RACIAL INJUSTICE AND LIFELONG DAMAGE

- 80% of children charged as adults are Black (despite Black children comprising only 30% of Maryland's child population).
- 70% experienced 6+ traumatic childhood events (ACEs) before arrest; 55% have a diagnosed disability (physical, mental, or learning).

UNDERMINES COMMUNITY SAFETY

- Children prosecuted in the adult system are more likely to reoffend and commit more serious crimes than those adjudicated in juvenile court.

FEDERAL LAW VIOLATION AND DANGEROUS

- Children charged as adults are held in adult facilities in violation of federal law. Maryland reports more violations than any other state.
- Children endure violence and solitary confinement.

DELAYS JUSTICE AND DRAINS RESOURCES

- Children charged as adults wait 125+ days in detention—some wait 2 years for trial. In juvenile court, detained cases must be heard within 30 days.
- Ending auto-charging would save Maryland \$17 million annually and reduce detention populations.

SOLUTION:



START ALL CASES IN JUVENILE COURT

- Saves millions in taxpayer money
- Protects children from violence and trauma
- Delivers justice faster
- Maintains judicial discretion for serious cases
