# For the 13th time, bill to end auto-charging dies in Annapolis

With the Maryland Legislative session coming to a close, there is a lot to cover regarding developments in bills in the various house and senate committees. Many different topics were voted on, but one piece of legislation stands out as the one that may be the most significant chance for juvenile justice reform in the history of the Maryland legislature. The Youth Equity and Safety (YES) act would start anyone arrested under 18 in juvenile court when charged with a crime. This bill had the support of many different government and non-profit organizations, including the Sentencing Project, Bridge Maryland, Governor Moore's office, and the Office of Public Defender. Unfortunately, neither of the two committees that could vote on this bill (the House Judiciary Committee and the Senate's Judicial Proceedings committee) put the bill on the voting list, which means that this bill effectively died in the house for the 13th time.

Contrary to popular belief, being under 18 does not mean a person will be automatically charged as a juvenile. Offenses such as carjacking, first-degree assault, and nearly 30 other crimes will automatically charge anyone over 13 as an adult in Maryland. Naturally, this policy increases the number of children charged as adults. It ultimately leads to adverse outcomes that often go hand in hand with the lack of resources in the adult justice system. Outcomes such as homelessness, addiction, and recidivism are too common when there is nothing to offer anyone in the adult justice system.
