

## What are Non-Safety-Related Traffic Stops?

Non-safety-related traffic stops are stops for minor traffic violations that do not actually make roads less safe. These stops are usually for equipment violations, vehicle registration issues, or low-level traffic infractions (e.g., broken taillight, defective brake light, window tints, expired registration, driving in a bus-only lane, etc.).

## Why are Non-Safety-Related Traffic Stops Problematic?

Permitting officers to stop drivers for non-safetyrelated traffic offenses wastes police resources by diverting their attention away from dangerous driving. In addition, **these stops do not improve public safety, they expose police and drivers to violent encounters, and they produce racial disparities in traffic enforcement.** Studies show that Black drivers are stopped 20% more often than white drivers when these stops are allowed.

## What Happens When Non-Safety-Related Traffic Stops are Limited?

Data from other jurisdictions demonstrates that reducing non-safety-related traffic stops **improves traffic safety, strengthens public safety and community trust, spares drivers and officers the dangers of unnecessary traffic stops, and reduces racial disparities in traffic enforcement.** 

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
