## **Involuntary Admission (IVA): Emergency Petition Application**

A person can be involuntarily admitted to a psychiatric facility if they are determined by a physician and a second clinician to:

1. Mental disorder

2. As a result of their mental disorder, be a danger to themselves or others.

Maryland Code, Health-General § 10-615

### **IVA: The Emergency Petition (EP) process**

Emergency petition filed by any interested party

Authorized by police, clinician or judge





Executed by police taking person to hospital for examination

# Emergency Department Evaluation within 6 hours

 Two medical professionals must certify 5 criteria for involuntary admission





#### Hospital determination

- Criteria not met: Voluntary treatment or discharge
- Criteria met: Search for inpatient psychiatric facility and involuntary commitment.

## **IVA: Administrative Law Hearing Process**

Within 10-17 days, an Administrative Law Judge rules on 5 criteria:

- (1) The individual has a mental disorder;
- (2) The individual needs inpatient care or treatment;
- (3) The individual presents a danger to the life or safety of themself or of others;
- (4) The individual is unable or unwilling to be admitted voluntarily; and
- (5) There is **no available, less restrictive form of intervention** that is consistent with the **welfare and safety of the individual**.

### **IVA: Administrative Law Hearing Outcomes**

#### If all five criteria are not met:

• Immediate discharge.


#### If all five criteria are met:

- Involuntary Civil Commitment.
- During Commitment A Clinical Review Panel (CRP) may authorize forced medication.

#### **Commitment Duration:**

- At end of 6 months, hospital can recertify the individual.
- Requires two medical professionals to examine and certify that the individual meets all 5 criteria.
- A new commitment hearing is then held to extend the individual's involuntary commitment.
