



Non-safety-related traffic stops are for minor violations that do not make roads safer.

Minor violations include equipment violations, vehicle registration issues, or low-level traffic infractions.

> Examples: broken taillight, defective brake light, window tints, expired registration, driving in a bus-only lane, etc.

Safer **Traffic Stops** for All



Maryland currently has 5 non-safety-related violations that cannot be the primary reason for a traffic stop.

Officers can issue citations or warnings for these violations but they cannot be the reason for the stop.



Safer Traffic Stops for All will limit 9 additional nonsafety-related violations.

> Officers will no longer be able to use these 9 violations alone to pull people over.



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Safer Traffic Stops for All

Consequences of nonsafety-related stops:

- expose police and drivers to potentially dangerous encounters,
- contribute to racial disparities in traffic enforcement, and
- waste police resources by diverting their attention away from dangerous driving.

Studies show that Black drivers are stopped 20% more often than white drivers when nonsafety-related stops are allowed.

Benefits of limiting nonsafety-related stops:

- improved traffic and public safety,
- strengthened community trust,
- reduced risks of unnecessary traffic stops,
- decreased racial disparities in traffic enforcement, and
- no negative impact on crime reduction or road safety.
